"Allyship: Someone who advocates for groups or individuals who do not come from the same place or privilege as the ally. Being an ally is considered one of the first steps in race and social justice work"

"Accomplice: encompasses allyship but goes beyond advocacy. An accomplice uses their privilege to challenge existing conditions at the risk of their own comfort and well-being".
